To continue to grow in our spirit the very first step is truthful humility. St. Thomas Aquinas defines it this way,

"Humility means seeing ourselves as God sees us: knowing that every good we have come from him as pure gift. Humility requires great surrender and detachment in life."

For Faith to grow and be alive we must first be humble. How do we know how to become humble? Jesus Christ has given us the truest example of humility. He is the mediator of the New Covenant. He humbled himself becoming obedient unto death, even death on a cross and won for us the possibility of heaven.

Jesus continues to humble himself at every Eucharistic celebration transforming earthly elements into His body, blood, soul, and divinity.

As Easter continues this week, we pray that our hearts become more humble. Our humble hearts will allow God's love and mercy to lead the way to a deeper faith.

Having that deeper faith can renew and re-ignite the very bright light of the Glory of Easter. We can break the barriers around our hearts by prayer to continue to live in the eternal light of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

From the desire of being esteemed, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being loved, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being extolled, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being honored, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being praised, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being preferred to others, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being consulted, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the desire of being approved, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being humiliated, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being despised, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of suffering rebukes, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being calumniated, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being forgotten, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being ridiculed, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being wronged, Deliver me, Jesus.

From the fear of being suspected, Deliver me, Jesus.
